We had a great site visit to Bookwalter Winery in September. Thank you to everyone who participated. We will be heading back to virtual monthly meetings for October and November.

October will focus on Risk Management and how to easily think about risks, and manage, mitigate, and determine effectiveness of the mitigation. With risk management in mind, there are several risks to manage as we move into the Fall and Winter seasons.

Fireplace risk management. Inspect your fireplace before lighting the first fire. If you have a fireplace in your home, be sure to have it cleaned and inspected before lighting your first fire of the season.

Candle risk management. While glowing candles make any environment feel cozier, remember to keep burning candles away from anything that could burn, such as curtains, bedding, or books. And always extinguish candles before going to bed or leaving the house.

Roadway risk management. School buses, students on bicycles, and teen drivers are out on the roads. Slow down and take extra care to look for children in school zones, near playgrounds and residential areas.

Winter yard risk management. You've enjoyed your beautiful lawn and garden all summer, but now is the time to prepare it for cold weather. Leaf blowers can be loud and blow more than just leaves, so be sure to wear eye and hearing protection to keep you safe from flying debris and preserve your hearing from the dangerous effects of repeated exposure to loud noises.

Ladder risk management. Falling is one of the most common reasons for trips to the emergency room. If you plan to clean out your gutters, work as a team when using the ladder. Ladders can buckle or slip, so have someone else hold the ladder as you climb up and down.

Let's all think about our Fall and Winter risks and develop risk mitigation/management plans to make sure that we get through the seasons safely and without issue.

OVERCOMING RESISTANCE TO RISK MANAGEMENT INITIATIVES

Risk management is a vital skill for anyone who wants to achieve their goals and avoid potential pitfalls. However, not everyone in your team or organization may share your enthusiasm for identifying and mitigating risks. Some may resist risk management initiatives because they fear change, lack trust, or prefer the status quo. How can you overcome resistance and foster a positive risk culture and communication? Here are some tips that may help.

Understand the sources of resistance: To overcome resistance, it is important to understand the motivation(s) behind it. Then you can adjust your approach to meet the specific needs and concerns of stakeholders.

Communicate the benefits and value of risk management: Show them how it can help achieve their objectives and improve their performance. Create a clear and compelling vision for risk management, linking it to the mission, vision, and values of the organization. This will help increase the awareness, understanding, and buy-in of stakeholders.

Involve and empower stakeholders: Seek input and feedback from stakeholders on risk identification, assessment, and response. Encourage collaboration and dialogue among different groups and perspectives, provide training and coaching on risk management skills and tools, delegate authority and responsibility for risk management actions and outcomes, and create a supportive and trusting environment for risk taking and learning. Solicit and incorporate lessons learned and best practices.

Address and overcome barriers and challenges: Try to anticipate potential issues or conflicts. Start by identifying and prioritizing the key risks and their impact and likelihood, then develop and implement risk management plans and contingency plans. Communicate the status and results of risk management to stakeholders, escalating any problems or risks that require higher-level attention or intervention

Reinforce and sustain a positive risk culture and communication: Establish and enforce clear risk management policies, integrate risk management with other processes, request feedback, identify gaps, celebrate successes, and promote a risk management mindset. By doing this, you create a culture that supports your leadership development and organizational goals.



Integrated Logistics Support

What is Integrated Logistics Support (ILS)? For defense, it's ensuring that the optimum mission system is delivered to the end user in the best possible condition with the ability to fulfill its designed mission role under the stated operational conditions as per its intended mission profile.

Reliability, Availability, and Maintainability (RAM) are the backbones of every ILS program.

This presentation will likely be of special interest to individuals involved in reliability and systems engineering. These elements range from engineering and maintenance support, supply support, training support, technical data, personnel, facilities, packaging, handling, storage, and preservation (PHS&T), support and test equipment, computer support, and disposal. The presentation will be fairly high-level and will aim to give the viewers an overview of the elements of logistics support and some examples of how it can be applied and the tools that can be used.

About the speaker: Jonathan Butler is an industry-experienced professional who currently works for Thales as AJISS (Arctic and Offshore Patrol Ship/Joint Support Ship In-Service Support Supportability) Manager. He has over 20 years of experience in structures, mechanical systems, reliability and maintainability and integrated logistics support analysis. He has worked on naval vessels and aircraft defense platforms for the Canadian Department of National Defense.

Jonathan holds Master's degrees in Technology Management, Engineering and Applied Science from Memorial University, as well as a Bachelor of Engineering Technology (Manufacturing) and Diploma in Mechanical Engineering Technology from Cape Breton University. The Practical Side of Risk Management

Managing risks is a daily activity that we all do – sometimes without thinking about it. For example, how many of you use your seat belts while driving? This is a risk mitigation activity to help you get to your end destination in a safe manner.

While we do some risk management activities without much thought, this month's meeting will discuss four steps (assess, plan, document, and evaluate) to a risk management approach using practical approaches that can be used on the simplest or most complex of projects or activities.

Success in risk management relies on collaborating with everyone involved with the activity and always being sure to consider "what could go wrong."

Our session will include an overview of how to manage risks, followed by a brainstorming session to complete our own risk register.

About the speaker: Denise Clements is the Vice President, Quality Director Americas, for AECOM. She also sits on the Global Integrated Management System (IMS) Steering Committee representing the global Design & Consulting Services Business, which implements, maintains, and improves the various components of AECOM's operations, providing a common global system for use on all AECOM projects.

Denise's career began as a mechanical engineer in the nuclear industry. Later, as part-owner of a small engineering-fabrication firm, she developed its nuclear quality assurance program compliant with ASME NQA-1 and managed the fabrication shop operations. Shortly after joining AECOM in 2000, Denise was named Chief Quality Officer for one of AECOM's early operating companies, DMJM Holmes & Narver. In that role, she successfully introduced the first ISO 9001-certified quality management system for the company. In subsequent years as operating companies merged and dissolved and AECOM grew not only organically but also by acquisition, she successfully led multiple mergers of disparate quality management systems into a coherent whole, all while maintaining the ISO 9001 certification. Denise also worked with AECOM developers to program systems for streamlining project management workflows, internal auditing through online tools linked to the financial system for analysis, and a supplier prequalification tool.
